

What are Topical Modules?

- Short sets of questions on topics of interest to higher education institutions
- Appended to core NSSE survey
- Institutions may add one Topical Module to the core survey at no charge
- A second module can be added for \$250
 - Exception: institutions asking consortium questions (more on this later!) can append no more than one module to the core instrument

Academic Advising

- Updated for NSSE 2020
- Examines students' experiences with academic advising, including:
 - frequency of interaction with advisors
 - exposure to various advising practices
 - identifying people/resources who have been helpful
- Designed to reflect National Academic Advising Association (NACADA) core values

Career & Workforce Preparation

- New for 2021 administration!
- Assesses how the college experience prepares students for their future, including:
 - institutional contributions to students' career plans
 - influences on their goals
 - confidence in work-related skills
 - career exploration in the curriculum
 - use of career resources and services
- Collaboration with Strada Education Network

Civic Engagement

- Updated for NSSE 2019
- Asks students to:
 - assess conflict resolution skills
 - examine perceptions of support for activism
 - report frequency of engagement with campus, local, state, national, or global issues
- Adapted from a pilot survey developed by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities

Coping with COVID

- New for 2021 administration!
- Explores the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on students' educational experiences, mental wellness, and everyday life experiences
- Addresses:
 - perceptions of faculty and institutional responses
 - disruptions to educational plans
 - living situation details
 - stressors and negative emotional experiences
 - changes in leisure activities and time demands

Development of Transferable Skills

- Updated for 2021 administration
- Examines activities that develop useful and transferable skills for the workplace and beyond:
 - verbal and written fluency
 - critical thinking
 - creative thinking and problem solving
 - project and time management
- Originally adapted from a pilot survey that was developed by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities

Experiences with Online Learning

- New for the 2021 administration!
- Measures instructional aspects considered ideal for online courses, including:
 - how students engage in both online and hybrid courses
 - degree of comfort with online learning
 - experiences of support
 - ideas about how learning experience can be improved
- Based in part on Standards for the Quality Matters Higher Education Rubric (6th Ed.)

Experiences with Writing

- Items touch on three aspects of good writing
 - assignments:
 - interactivity
 - meaning-making
 - clarity



Ongoing collaboration between NSSE and the Council of Writing Program Administrators

First-Year Experiences & Senior Transitions

- Includes separate items for first-year students and seniors (based on institution-reported class level)
- First-year items focus on academic perseverance, help-seeking behaviors, and institutional commitment
- Senior items explore post-graduation plans, links between the academic major and future plans, and confidence in skill development
- Some items adapted from the Beginning College Survey of Student Engagement and the Strategic National Arts Alumni Project (with partial support from the National Endowment for the Arts)

Global Learning

Assesses student experiences and coursework that emphasize:

- global affairs
- world cultures
- nationalities
- religions
- other international topics
- Designed to complement the American Council on Education's 2016 edition of the Mapping Internationalization on U.S. Campuses survey

Inclusiveness & Engagement with Cultural Diversity

- Examines environments, processes, and activities that reflect the engagement and validation of cultural diversity and promote greater understanding of societal differences
- Items explore:
 - exposure to inclusive teaching practices and intercultural learning
 - perceptions of institutional values and commitment regarding diversity
 - participation in diversity-related programming and coursework

What Do I Get From Module Participation?

- "Frequencies and Statistical Comparisons" report for all module items
- Ability to customize a comparison group from other module participants
- Student-level respondent data file (SPSS)

What is Consortium Participation?

- A group of five or more institutions may form around a common interest or mission
- Short set of survey items (subject to NSSE review) appended to core survey
 - OR coordinated use of Topical Modules among participants
- Institutional fees range between \$100-\$400, depending on the use and types of additional questions added

Consortium Participation for 2021 Administration

Additional question set:

- Catholic Colleges & Universities
- Council for Christian Colleges & Universities
- Honors Education Consortium
- Jesuit Colleges and Universities
- Mission Engagement Consortium for Independent Colleges
- New American Colleges and Universities

No additional question set:

- Connecticut State Universities
- Indiana University
- Tennessee Publics



What Do I Get From Consortium Participation?

- "Frequencies and Statistical Comparisons" report for all consortium items
- Ability to customize a comparison group from other consortium participants (if large enough)
- Student-level respondent data file (SPSS)

- If no additional items, same as module benefits
- Some consortia have data sharing requirements

How Should You Select Your Modules or Consortium?

Choosing only 2 modules, or 1 module and 1 consortium from so many options can be tough!

Factors:

Appeal of the topic (responsive to campus concern, interests)

specific campus audiences)

Repeat for continuity, or to assess change

- New topics suit current needs
- FSSE companion set availability



Timeline for Survey Customization

 All Topical Module and Consortium selections should be made by December 4, 2020

 Later than in previous years to accommodate COVIDrelated interruptions and maximize communication with various stakeholders on campus

 Customization is done through the NSSE User Interface
