Who Was Leonard Berns

- Leonard Bernstein (1918 990) was one of the most iconic composer conductors of the twentieth-century
- He was the music director of the New York Philharmonic from 19581969
 - Most famous works:

Struggle with Homosexuality



Was Leonard Bernstein heterosexual? Homosexual? Bisexual?

Heterosexual and Homosexual?

- Bernstein might have been heterosexual emotionally and homosexual physically
- Marriage to Felicia
 - Three children
 - She knew that he liked men,
 but stayed in the relationship
 - Quote from Felicia's letter





"Look, you know I get it. It's complicated. But let's do this because we love each other. Let's make a family and let's just go forward."

Felicia Bernstein, in a letter to Leonard recently opened by Jamie Bernstein

Bisexual?

Yes, Bernstein married a woman, but he had numerous relationships with men—emotionally and physically

Luckily, we do not have to assume Bernstein's sexual orientation.



The Winner Is... Homosexual!

While a couple Bernstein biographers labeled Berstein as bisexual, there's no evidence that he ever self-identified as such



- Biographers Humphrey
 Burt on and Meryle
 Secrest might have used
 the term bis exual to
 "protect" Bernstein's
 legacy
- □ Quote from Arthur Laurents



"Bernstein was simply a gay man who got married. He wasn't conflicted about his sexual orientation at all. He was just gay."

Arthur Laurents, collaborated with Bernstein on West Side Story

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Homophobia





Three Strikes and You're Out!

One of Bernstein's lifelong dreams was to become a music director

- During the mid-1900s, being gay would have risked Bernstein's chances at becoming a music director
 - Bernstein could not hide the fact that he was American or Jewish

Three Strikes Against Him

- □ American
- □ Jewish
- Homosexual



Homophobic Father?

Bernstein's father might not have liked the fact that his son was a homosexual Futher Explained In...

□ A Quiet Place



- Bernstein included many father figures in his music
- Were the father figures supposed to be like his own father?







Candide (1956)


- ☐ "Glitter and Be Gay"
 - Cunegonde was sold as a sex slave
 - The aria talks about lost honor, shame and the need for purification
 - Similar situation for the LGBTQ+ experiencing homophobia during the time *Candide* as written
- Maximillian had several homosexual encounters
- Paquette had sex with almost every man she met



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Songfest (1977)


- ☐ "To What You Said"
 - An unpublished poem by Walt Whitman
 - "I am he who kisses his comrade lightly the lips at parting, and I am one who is kissed in return"
- Bernstein's homage to homosexual love
 - Tom Cothran, who was in a relationship with Bernstein at the time, helped him select the poetry fosongfest



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A Quiet Place (1983)

- Junior is a bisexual man with incest fantasies about his sister
- ☐ Junior's homosexual relationship with François
- Junior and Dede's estrangement from the father Sam
 - Sam is the father figure AfQuiet Place
 - Sam might have been homophobic
 - Turmoil of the gay rights movement threatened the authority of white, middleclass men like Sam



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


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Conclusion

Leonard Bernstein was a homosexual man who achieved great success as a composer-conductor

- His wife Felicia knew that he was a homosexual, but they still decided to make a family together
- The fear of "striking out" was eminent, but Bernstein remained successful
- Bernstein used sexuality in his music to truly express himself





"To be a success as a Broadway composer, you must be Jewish or gay. I'm both."
