A BACKWARD GLANCE O'ER TRAVEL'D ROADS

THE FIRST influential list of "One Hundred Books" was compiled by Sir John Lubbock (later Right Hon. Lord Avebury, P.C.) as Chapter IV, "The Choice of Books," in his charming series of essays, The Pleasures of Life (London, 1887). Quoting from the 1921 edition, Sir John wrote:

Our ancestors had great difficulty in procuring books. Ours now is what to select. We must be careful what we read, and not, like the sailors of Ulysses, take bags of wind for sacks of treasure . . . lest, as too often happens, we should waste time over trash

I have often wished some one would recommend a list of a hundred good books. If we had such lists drawn up by a few good guides they would be most useful

In the absence of such lists I have picked out the books most frequently mentioned with approval by those who have referred directly or indirectly to the pleasure of reading, and have ventured to include some which, though less frequently mentioned, are especial favourites of my own

I have abstained, for obvious reasons, from mentioning works by living authors . . . and I have omitted works on science, with one or two exceptions, because the subject is so progressive.

Sir John's famous list, which was first delivered as a lecture to the London Working Men's College, started a trend. Contemporary interest was so great that the London Pall Mall Gazette issued as "Extra" No. 24, "The Best Hundred Books by the Best Judges." Contributors included

Lord Bryce, John Ruskin, and Wilkie Collins. Soon other "Hundred" lists were compiled by Lord Acton and Mr. Shorter. Sir John was not impressed. In the Preface to his latest edition available to me (London, 1921, "41st Edition—273rd Thousand"), he states: "Neither Lord Acton nor Mr. Shorter has convinced me that I should drop any of the books from my list." Mr. Shorter's list is condemned because "it is too light, too merely amusing He prefers Rasselas to Molière and finds a place for Rousseau's Confessions, Boccaccio, and Tom Jones."

Admitting Lord Acton's list does not suffer from levity, he complains that, though "of sterling worth, some [inclusions] seem to me too technical, some too special."

Modern taste would seem to agree with this, considering that Lord Acton includes Mignet's Négociations Relatives a la Succession d'Espagna, Carte's Histoire du Mouvement Religieux dans le Canton de Vaud, Schneckenburger's Vergleichende Darstellung, Hundeshagen's Kirchenverfassungsgeschichte, and similar reading. I had imagined until recently that it was from reading of this nature that Acton drew his famous statement: "Power corrupts and absolute power corrupts absolutely." But that was an earlier Acton.

Still, there is on Sir John's list at least one work, St. Hilaire's Le Bouddha et sa religion, which is not in one library I know of which has over a million and a half volumes, in any edition. Sir John's list is overloaded with Orientalia, and who today reads Samuel Smiles? Also, he fudged a little in his hundred on the works of Scott "which indeed, constitute a library in themselves, but which I must ask, in return for my trouble, to be allowed, as a special favour, to count as one."

He was a man of strong convictions. He lists Smith's Wealth of Nations, "part of"; Plato's Dialogues, "at any rate, the Apology, Crito, and Phaedo," and adds that though he includes the Sheking and the Analects of Confucius for their influence, "I must humbly confess I do not greatly admire either I may add that both works are quite short."

So far as I know, he only made two changes in his original list. In 1890 he added Kālidāsa's Sakuntala and Schiller's William Tell, "omitting, in consequence, Lucretius and Miss Austen: Lucretius because though his work is most remarkable, it is perhaps too difficult and therefore less generally suitable than most of the others on the list; and Miss Austen because English novelists were somewhat overrepresented." Ten were included.

List-makers of the "Best," "Good," "Influential," etc. still continue, one of the latest being by Somerset Maugham, and their compilers include such figures as Arnold Bennett and Sir Winston Churchill. The history of twentieth-century book collecting has been considerably influenced by these lists—foremost by the original "Grolier Hundred"—One Hundred Books Famous in English Literature (New York, 1902). Another Grolier is One Hundred Influential American Books Printed Before 1900 (New York, 1947), and most recently, the exhibition is over although the catalogue is not yet printed, "One Hundred Famous Scientific Books."

Another list which was extremely important in directing collectors' activities in America and dealers' activities in England during the 1920's and 30's was A. Edward Newton's "One Hundred Good Novels," published in *This Book-Collecting Game* (Boston, 1928). The thick dust of oblivion has already fallen on some of Newton's selections

but it was a collecting catalyst. A better list, because more eclectic, was that of William Lyon Phelps, in Scribner's Magazine, October, 1930, "One Hundred Best Novels," which did not confine itself to English. This was not addressed, as was Newton's, to book collectors but to general readers, for a considerable and important segment of whom Phelps was guide and mentor.

Professors, besides Phelps, have also taken a hand, and two recent lists have come from Princeton: "The Hundred Great English Books" and "One Hundred Notable American Books" in *The Princeton University Library Chronicle*, February, 1936, and Winter, 1958, issues, respectively. The Great Books of the Western World program managed to get their selections into fifty-four volumes, two each being given to Aristotle, Shakespeare, Thomas Aquinas, and Gibbon, though four Greek dramatists get into one volume. It all adds up to seventy-four authors.

Taken together, these lists furnish a comprehensive and rounded group of authors and titles of proved and presumed importance. There is, of course, especially in literature, considerable duplication.

No library in the world has all of these works in their original printings nor can any ever hope to do so. Beginning from scratch it would be relatively simple and not too costly to acquire 40 per cent of them, less easy to secure the next 35 per cent, but from there on trouble, not to mention expense.

And if one is not content with just any copy of a title, but insists on superb condition, original binding, first issue or state, association interest, and other bibliographical niceties wherever possible, the problem becomes formidable. After all, if you want your Adams' History of the United

States to be one of the six copies on thin paper, and Aldrich's Story of a Bad Boy to be one of the six copies on thick paper, odds against securing them all rise dramatically. Mr. Lilly's achievement, as recorded here, is the more remarkable in view of his unflinchingly high standards. Incidentally, the books listed here form but a very small per cent (perhaps 2) of his gift to Indiana University.

As a working example of collecting problems, let us consider Princeton's record on one of these lists, their own of English literature, simply because they have thoroughly documented it. When first published in 1936, they had eighteen of the books on the list; Harvard, 79; Yale, 74. A report in 1942, with Huntington added, showed Huntington, 95; Yale, 92, an increase of 18; Harvard, 83, an increase of 4; and Princeton, 34, an increase of 16.

By 1946, Princeton's holdings numbered 63, due largely to the Parrish gift, and in 1949 "recent gifts and one purchase have raised the total to seventy-two." As of the latest printed report in *The Princeton University Library Chronicle*, Spring, 1955, the total was 76. It is currently 79. In the period since 1942, Huntington added two titles, both by gift, 97; Harvard, two, 85; and Yale, none, 92. Indiana's current holdings, on this particular list, are 85; 64 of these having been Lilly's.

These figures represent the various libraries' holdings only in first editions. A rigid census of "first editions, first states or issues" would reduce them. For example, the Huntington Library reports having Wordsworth's Lyrical Ballads, 1798, because this is how it is entered on the Princeton list. They do not, however, possess the Bristol imprint of this year, but the London. Similarly, Princeton credits themselves with this work in their own list, although

they also do not have the Bristol imprint. And some libraries reporting Hakluyt's *Principal Navigations* (London, 1598-1600) do not have copies with the first state of the text and map, etc. And then how does one record "offprints" or "first separate printings" as against "original appearances?" Turner's "The Significance of the Frontier in American History" certainly came out in two journals before its first separate appearance. Holmes's "The Contagiousness of Puerperal Fever" was first printed in the short-lived *New England Quarterly Journal of Medicine and Surgery*. And Calhoun's "A Disquisition on Government and A Discourse on the Constitution of the United States," issued in 1851 as part of volume one of his *Works*, did not achieve the distinction of a separate printing during the nineteenth century.

The curious may note some apparent contradictions, bibliographically speaking, between the Grolier and Princeton lists. For example, the Princeton "American Hundred" lists London, 1666, for Michael Wigglesworth's Day of Doom. The Grolier "American Hundred" lists it as London, 1673. The explanation is that the Princeton list attempts the ideal. Grolier's is what was actually shown at their notable exhibitions. The earliest recorded edition of Day of Doom is the unique British Museum copy dated London, 1666. But there may also be a Cambridge edition of that date. And, if one wants to be theoretical, Mr. Winship believed it to have been first printed in 1662. Grolier lists what they exhibited, the earliest available printing, of which Sabin records six copies; Princeton what they thought was first.

Incidentally, Moses Coit Tyler says that this work had, for a hundred years, a popularity far exceeding that of

any work, in prose or verse, produced in America before the Revolution. Here is what happened to juvenile delinquents in those days:

With Iron bands they bind their hands, and curséd feet together,
And cast them all, both great and small, into that Lake forever,
Where day and night, without respite, they wail, and cry and howl
For tort'ring pain which they sustain in Body and in Soul.

In like manner, Princeton lists Mary Rowlandson's True History as Cambridge (Mass.), 1682, the Grolier as London, 1682. No complete copy is known of the first edition (Boston, 1682), a fragment of four leaves only surviving. Princeton lists: "Richard Tottel, Tottel's Miscellany, 1557"; Grolier, "Howard's Songes and Sonettes, London, 1567." Howard, Earl of Surrey (and others), of course, wrote the book; Richard Tottell published it. The first edition (June, 1557) is known only by the Bodleian copy. The Huntington copy is one of two known of the July, 1557, edition; and, according to Jackson, "an unhappy one"—the other is Grenville. Grolier exhibited the 1567 edition.

If one is going to place one's standards this high, it is difficult to see why Princeton lists Carlyle's Sartor Resartus as London, 1838, rather than London, 1834, or Boston, 1836. Or why Blake's Songs of Innocence and Songs of Experience (London, 1789 and 1798, respectively) are listed independently when, so far as is known, no separate edition of the latter has ever been recorded. Why Sidney's Defence of Poesie (London, 1595) was chosen, rather than his Apol-

ogy for Poetry, probably issued earlier the same year by another publisher, both being substantially the same work, is unclear. Four copies of the former are known, seventeen of the latter, which makes things really difficult for list collectors, if that matters. Incidentally, both Huntington and Yale list themselves in the Princeton census as possessing it, although actually they both have the Apology, not the Defence. Also why was Samuel Johnson's Lives of the Most Eminent English Poets, three volumes (Dublin, 1779-81), included rather than the earlier Prefaces, Biographical and Critical to the Works of the English Poets, ten volumes (London, 1779-81)?

And surely if Lamb's Last Essays of Elia is included, it should be the Philadelphia, 1828 edition, not the London, 1833. William Byrd's History of the Dividing Line, listed as Richmond, 1866, was first published in the Westover Manuscripts (Petersburg, 1841). And Hemingway's first work, Three Stories and Ten Poems, was not "Paris, 1923," etc. Perhaps the explanation is the same as Dr. Johnson's reply to the lady who asked him why he had defined "pastern" as the knee of a horse.

There are also those unresolved problems of the works on which the authorities disagree. Should Paradise Lost have the author's name in large or small capitals? Is Roger Williams' Bloudy Tenet preferable to Bloudy Tenent, assuming one is lucky enough to secure either? How do you prefer the title page of your 1616 Ben Jonson Works, a la Jackson or Wilson? And, in the matter of Pope, are you a Griffith or a Wise guy?

Briefly, the Grolier lists were compiled by book collectors, Princeton's by professors, and taken by and large the former are much more bibliographically minded than the latter, in my observation. It is significant to note that no librarian seems to have ventured his "Hundred" opinion. Asa Don Dickinson, when at the University of Pennsylvania, distilled, in true Pennsylvania tradition, all available lists, moved one decimal point to the right, and produced, in 1924, One Thousand Best Books. The Lifetime Vade-Mecum of the Reading Man, the first of his numerous similar compilations. But these are statistical, not original. Bookdealers, similarly, have never drawn up lists of "Bests," etc. Mr. Lilly once asked Dr. Rosenbach for such a list of Americana and later observed that it seemed rather overweighted with works the Doctor happened to have currently in stock.

It all adds up to fun: "confusin' but amusin'," as Little Abner is wont to remark; "De Gustibus" as Browning titled one of his clearer poems. The compiler of these notes is currently engaged in drawing up his own hundred list, against all precedent. It is "One Hundred Important Books Which Do Not Appear On Any Other List of One Hundred Important Books." And an impressive lot it gives promise of being.

In the following notes, the number of copies known is sometimes given. Such figures are taken from standard sources, author bibliographies, various censuses, catalogues such as Pforzheimer and Streeter, occasionally the compiler's opinion, and should be considered as indications only, "subject to change without notice."

Acquisitions, as recounted above, follow a fairly predictable curve. A certain percentage of the books is simply unobtainable except through the sheer chance of a new discovery and that can obviously go to only one library, if indeed a library gets it at all.

Caxton's printing of Le Mort d'Arthur (Westminster, 1485) is known, perfect, only by the copy in the Morgan Library; Howard's Songes and Sonettes (London, June, 1557) is unique at the Bodleian; the only known copy of Lobachevskii's D Nachalakh Geometrie (Kazan, 1829-30), exhibited at the recent Grolier science show, was loaned by the Russian government; while the unique Mail Order broadside (Chicago, 1872), shown in the Grolier American exhibit, came from the Montgomery Ward files.

Only two copies are known of the first edition of Parson Weems's Life and Memorable Actions of George Washington (Baltimore, 1800), and three of the fifth edition (Augusta, Georgia, 1806) "enriched with a great number of curious anecdotes," not the least of which is the hatchet story. And of another President, Lincoln, but two copies exist of the first printing of the Gettysburg Address (Washington, 1862), although five manuscript copies are known.

Of another Lincoln, Mrs. D. A., but three copies of her Boston Cook Book (Boston, 1884) are recorded. The reason is obvious, as it was a book that was used; to date, over 2,500,000 copies have been sold. And Thomas Paine's Rights of Man (London, 1791), known to the compiler in its correct issue by three copies only, is rare for another reason—change of publishers for fear of prosecution. And with reason, it happened.

There are a great many books on these lists which are much commoner than these rarities but which, if a library does not already possess them, will be difficult to secure. One factor is cost. The first Shakespeare folio (London, 1623) is not a rare book, except when perfect, as some two hundred copies are known, but even imperfect it is an expensive one. About fifteen American colleges own copies

in varying states but not one (I believe) bought a copy. A university, especially a state university, is reluctant to purchase from its own funds a single rarity of this stature. And there are other books on these lists in the same category.

As with Shakespeare, enough copies of some books are known to deny them the appellative "rare," yet, as they are already permanently placed, they might as well be unique from the point of view of availability to anyone desiring them. There are at least forty copies of Harvey's *De Motu Cordis* (Frankfort, 1628), and twenty copies of Milton's *Comus* (London, 1637), but no perfect copy is privately owned.

Putting aside the books recognizably rare for reasons of antiquity, consider the nineteenth century. Many books published within a hundred years or so are very elusive. The Russian novels are one example, and some French works, especially in their various limited states, another. But of the trade publication of Henry Adams' Democracy (New York, 1880), Jacob Blanck locates but one copy of the correct issue in his Bibliography of American Literature, and that privately owned. And, ironically, Mrs. Browning's Poems (London, 1850), in which her "Sonnets from the Portuguese" first appears, is in its first state title page and binding much rarer than Thomas J. Wise's notorious forgery of them. These are among other unpublicized rarities on these lists which are not expensive. But try and find them!

This is not a counsel to despair of acquiring copies of known rarities; it simply points out that it is unlikely that any person or institution can ever get all of them. Within very recent years, completely unknown and unrecorded copies have turned up of the Gutenberg Bible, the Bay Psalm Book, Caxton's Canterbury Tales (1484), Poe's Tamerlane,

The Murders in the Rue Morgue (two copies), Bacon's Essays (second edition), Harvey's De Motu Cordis (two copies), and The Declaration of Independence, to list some random examples. "Fini" can never be written to any rare book census.

As a complete check list of J. K. Lilly's magnificent library now at Indiana University has not yet been compiled, it seems useful to record here our current holdings of these various lists. It is as interesting to see what is lacking as what is present. A fair number of gaps can be easily and cheaply filled; others, though inexpensive, will be very difficult to come by; still others, and among these some famous rarities, will always be available whenever funds are; others—quién sabe?

As the Lilly holdings have strength in depth in many titles on these lists, Poe, Whitman, the Declaration of Independence, and the Mirror for Magistrates, for example, it seemed best to do a little more than a mere title check list of first editions and to include Indiana's resources. Though the condition of the books is not stressed, except defects, bindings are mentioned, as original state plays an important part in contemporary collecting. Significant contemporary editions other than the first are mentioned when of importance. Issue points are not elaborated unless the information is generally unavailable elsewhere. Provenance is indicated where known. Multiple copies identical with the one catalogued are not mentioned.

The original lists were variously arranged; the Grolier's and Princeton's chronologically, Newton's alphabetically by title, Phelps's "roughly chronologically," and the *Great Books* by subject. We have put these into one author alphabet. Following each entry is a symbol of its list:

GE: (Grolier) One Hundred Books Famous in English Literature.

GA: (Grolier) One Hundred Influential American Books.

GR: Great Books of the Western World.

N: (Newton) "One Hundred Good Novels." In This Book-Collecting Game.

PE: (Princeton) "The Hundred Great English Books."

PA: (Princeton) "One Hundred Notable American Books."

Ph: (Phelps) "One Hundred Best Novels."

The Grolier Club science list has not yet been published and is not considered here. The Great Books, including Greek dramatists, philosophers, etc., present particular problems: for example, is the first edition the Latin, which is usually earlier, or the Greek which, although later, is the first printing in the original language? We have not attempted a breakdown of the actual first printings of the Great Books selections in these cases.

An asterisk before an entry indicates that it is lacking in Indiana University in its first edition. In this case, other significant contemporary editions, if any, are listed. An "L" before an entry indicates that it was part of the Lilly gift. Indiana's current holdings, calculated generously to include a few periodical appearances as firsts, vide Balzac and Holmes, are: Grolier, English, 94; Grolier, American, 89; Princeton, English, 85; Princeton, American, 89; Phelps, 89; and Newton, 99.


